

RESOLUTION NO. 22-44

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SUGAR LAND, TEXAS, ADOPTING A LEGISLATIVE AGENDA FOR THE 88th SESSION OF THE TEXAS LEGISLATURE TO INCLUDE SPECIAL CALLED SESSIONS OF THE 88th LEGISLATURE AND THE INTERIM.

WHEREAS, local government is the most direct and frequent point of contact with its residents; and

WHEREAS, the process for local government is a public and participatory process whereby the actions of local governments are subject to the public scrutiny of the residents; and

WHEREAS, local government is responsible for providing basic and emergency services; and

WHEREAS, local governments are the first responders in local emergencies; and

WHEREAS, the ability of local government to provide those services is dependent on the ability to have the necessary resources and authority to carry out its responsibilities; and

WHEREAS, local government officials are elected by the residents they represent to provide a wide array of services; and

WHEREAS, state representatives and senators are charged with working in the best interest of the citizens they represent; and

WHEREAS, residents of the state of Texas expect elected government officials representing local governments to make every effort to be informed on the needs of the constituents and the local government to ensure that local governments have the necessary authorities and resources in which to fulfill the desired needs of the citizens who have elected them; NOW, THEREFORE,

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL
OF THE CITY OF SUGAR LAND, TEXAS:**

Section 1. That City Council members will meet with area state representatives and senators to discuss the City's legislative agenda and provide both information and assistance on all matters relating to bills and other legislative matters that come before the Legislature to ensure that they have the resources to call upon in making decisions that impact the lives of their constituents.

Section 2. The City of Sugar Land shall proactively seek the filing and passage of any legislation identified as being sought in Exhibit A.

Section 3. The City Council IG Committee and the City's representative at the Texas Municipal League (TML) Business Meeting shall work with TML, peer cities in the State and other appropriate entities to jointly pursue the passage or defeat of legislation that is listed as "supported" or "opposed" by the City of Sugar Land in Exhibit A.

Section 4. The City Manager and his staff shall:

- a. Take all necessary actions to inform Sugar Land residents of the City's legislative agenda; and
- b. Encourage residents to make every effort to be aware of the local and state governing and legislative process and expect their elected representatives from all levels to seek a proactive and positive relationship that does not pass a burden from the State to the County or City without providing the tools and resources to undertake the added responsibility.


Section 5. That it believes it is incumbent of all legislators to work in consort with City and County government to ensure that the entire governing process is as effective as possible and, to that end, seek input and advice from the local level of government on issues that have a direct impact on their ability to undertake their responsibilities.

Section 6. That it expects elected representatives of state government to fully understand the implications of legislation they act upon to ensure there are no negative impacts on the community and to strongly support and take all actions necessary in furtherance of the attached legislation agenda, as it may be amended from time to time.

Section 7. That it believes the state legislative body should not exempt its members from any regulation that they impose upon any other member of a political subdivision unless it can clearly be shown that there is a clear and compelling need to do so.



EXHIBIT A

THE CITY OF SUGAR LAND
LEGISLATIVE AGENDA FOR THE 88TH SESSION OF THE TEXAS LEGISLATURE
Position Statements

Municipal Powers

1. **Support legislation that supports or advances the principles of local control to allow for locally elected officials to make decisions that are beneficial to the interests of City residents or that is otherwise beneficial to the City's interest.**
2. **Oppose legislation that preempts or erodes the authority of city government or is detrimental to the City's ability to pursue citizen priorities or respond to local citizen concerns.**

Municipal Revenue and Budgeting Authority

1. **Support legislation that reduces the overall tax burden on residents and businesses, including legislation that:**
 - a. **Adequately funds the public school finance system** – which would provide the largest savings to taxpayers;
 - b. **Eliminates unfunded mandates** on municipalities;
 - c. **Protects or enhances municipal revenues** such as property taxes, sales taxes, right-of-way revenues, service fees, and court fines;
 - d. **Provides for a fair and transparent appraisal process;**
 - e. **Allows and encourages local governments to continue to offer homestead and senior exemptions;**
 - f. **Provides for the fair and equitable local sourcing of sales and use taxes;**
 - g. **Accurately notifies and explains to taxpayers the actual impacts of the no-new-revenue tax rate, simplifies its calculation for notice purposes, and deletes parts of the notification and adoption process that causes confusion and is inconsistent with the goal of providing a transparent budget and tax rate setting process; and**
 - h. **Increases funding for arts & cultural programs.**
2. **Oppose legislation that would detrimentally affect the City's financial position and limit local budgeting authority by reducing revenue streams that fund services citizens depend on or negatively impact potential revenue growth critical for providing services – such as public safety – for a growing and aging community, including legislation that:**
 - a. **Imposes a revenue cap** of any type;
 - b. **Lowers the appraisal cap** or otherwise creates property tax exemptions that would unfairly shift the financial tax burden to other taxpayers;
 - c. **Restricts the ability of the City to issue debt in order to fund public improvements** through either General Obligation or Certificates of Obligation bonds or causes unnecessarily complex public notification requirements that are confusing to voters;
 - d. **Imposes an unfunded mandate;**
 - e. **Requires the City to generate revenues for the State thereby unfairly shifting local tax dollars outside of the City.**

Economic Development

1. *Support the City's right to continue participation in the qualified hotel project program.*
2. *Oppose legislation that would erode or restrict current municipal economic development tools.*
3. *Support legislation that expands the application of current municipal economic development tools such as allowing land to be used, transferred, conveyed, or swapped in Chapter 380 economic development agreements.*
4. *Support continuation of the Hotel Occupancy Tax (HOT) for tourism marketing.*

Land-Use Regulation and Annexation

1. *Oppose legislation that would diminish the City's authority to regulate growth and development through land use and zoning regulations, building codes, comprehensive planning, annexation, or eminent domain, or that would erode the City's authority to assess inspection fees for new, existing, or re-development.*
2. *Support legislation that returns control of regulating building materials to municipalities.*
3. *Oppose legislation that would diminish the City's authority to regulate short-term rentals.*
4. *Oppose any further erosion of the City's current authority within its ETJ.*
5. *Actively monitor, evaluate, and act, if necessary, on legislation that creates or modifies special districts within the City and its ETJ.*

Right-of-Way and Utilities

1. *Oppose legislation that would diminish the City's authority to charge solid waste franchise fees, enforce solid waste licenses, or maintain a solid waste franchise agreement.*
2. *Oppose legislation that would erode the City's authority to manage and control public rights-of-way and publicly owned land or limit the City's ability to receive fair market compensation for use of public rights-of-way.*
3. *Support legislation that would increase the authority of municipalities in requiring increased public notice of major pipeline activities – such as flaring – that have a direct impact on the quality of life of city residents.*
4. *Oppose legislation that would impose on cities: mandatory water conservation measures; "tap fees" or other types of state charge on municipal water systems; or any other onerous regulations as it relates to utilities provided by a city.*
5. *Oppose any legislation that would diminish or limit the City's original jurisdiction over electric and gas rates.*

Water Resources

1. *Actively monitor, evaluate, and act, if necessary, on any legislation related to the Gulf Coast Water Authority, the Fort Bend Subsidence District, and the Brazos River Authority including governance, water planning, water fees, and Watermaster issues.*
2. *Support legislation that would protect and expand the City's ability to purchase water, provide water to its residents and customers, use water within its City and Extraterritorial Jurisdiction Areas, and collaborate with local and regional entities on projects or initiatives that seek to enhance the City's water resources goals.*
3. *Support legislation that provides funding for State Water Plan projects that increase the State's water resources or further establishes long-term planning efforts for an affordable*

and reliable water supply for the Fort Bend and Houston areas – provided that the investments already made by the City are reflected in any proposed financing mechanisms.

Transportation

1. *Support legislation that increases state funding for transportation projects or creates local-option funding choices for transportation projects or that discontinues the diversion of transportation revenues to non-transportation purpose.*

Public Safety / Health

1. *Support increases to state funding for mental health.*
2. *Support legislation that provides additional funding to law enforcement agencies to receive increased active shooter training and equipment to protect officers.*
3. *Support legislation that provides for all officers who respond to active shooter incidents, including command level officers, to receive active shooter training.*
4. *Support expansion of current background check requirements to include review of juvenile records, including checks with state databases and local law enforcement, for the purposes of determining whether the individual has a juvenile record that meets criteria under existing law that disqualifies them from purchasing a firearm.*
5. *Support the passage of extreme risk protection order programs that strictly allow for due process and are designed to keep guns out of the hands of criminals, domestic abusers, terrorists (foreign and domestic), or those who intend to harm themselves or others to ensure that threats are identified before shootings occur.*
6. *Support legislation that strengthens current law as it relates to catalytic convertor theft and prevention, including increasing penalties for auto repair facilities and individual sellers who resell or are in possession of stolen catalytic convertors.*
7. *Support the ability of local governing bodies to determine the appropriate use of technology in public safety.*
8. *Support legislation that allows a city to impose more stringent requirements than the state related to a statewide ban on texting while driving.*
9. *Oppose any further reduction of local government oversight of the safety of home cottage food facilities.*

Purchasing

1. *Support continuation of alternative project delivery methods that allow municipalities to select contractors based on both price and qualifications.*

Open Meetings/Open Records

1. *Support the continued use of technology and other tools that provides for transparent, convenient, and secure virtual public meetings and encourages the general public to participate, provide feedback, and engage with State and local governments remotely.*
2. *Support legislation reducing the financial burden on local governments required by the Open Meetings Act and Open Records Requests such as expansion of the ability to charge for costs related to reproduction of public information.*
3. *Oppose any attempt that would make the current open meetings and public information laws more restrictive and ambiguous and support clarifications that enhance communication between elected officials and their constituents.*

4. *Support uniform application of the public information and open meetings laws at every level of government including State legislative and executive branches.*

Transparency/Ethics

1. *Support legislation that improves government transparency so long as such legislation does not create legal confusion or duplicate existing disclosure requirements.*

City Advocacy

1. *Support the City's ability to communicate with legislators and advocate on behalf of the community through:*
 - a. *Participation in grassroots advocacy efforts;*
 - b. *Membership with municipal associations;*
 - c. *Employment of in-house intergovernmental relations staff; and*
 - d. *Engagement of legislative consultants.*

Elections

1. *Support legislation that supports and/or increases voter participation so long as the option for the May uniform election date and the non-partisan nature of municipal elections are retained.*

Public Advertising

1. *Support legislation that would enable the use of electronic notice for all public notices.*

Collective Bargaining

1. *Oppose legislation that would impose expanded collective bargaining rights or expand current meet and confer laws.*

Texas Municipal Retirement System (TMRS)

1. *Support legislation that would protect the City's previous and future investments in the TMRS system.*

Homeowners Associations (HOAs)

1. *Support the authority and role of HOAs and oppose limitations on functions HOAs were created to perform except when those functions conflict with City ordinances, policies, and regulations.*

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

Approve Resolution No. 22-44, adopting the Legislative Agenda for the 88th Session of the Texas Legislature.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

The City has actively monitored potential legislation considered by the Texas Legislature for many years. In 2006, the City Manager expanded the program with the creation of the Office of Intergovernmental Relations (IGR) to better equip our City to respond to legislation that directly impacts our residents either financially or from a quality-of-life perspective. This is done by means of greater participation in the legislative process, forming alliances, and communicating directly with state-elected leaders and their staff.

Accordingly, as part of the City's IGR program, the City Council prepares a legislative agenda to provide state-elected leaders with the City Council's position on legislative topics that will be discussed and debated during the upcoming biennium. The Legislative Agenda is the backbone of all efforts contained within our legislative program.

The City's legislative program is based on three (3) pillars: 1) expert opinion, 2) community input, and 3) City Council direction.

Development of the Legislative Agenda begins in April and concludes in October of even-numbered years. The agenda is reviewed by a citizens task force, a City Council subcommittee, and then by City Council in a public forum. We strive to provide a legislative agenda that is as transparent as it is comprehensive.

The 2023-2024 State Legislative Agenda focuses on several key priorities, including:

- Supporting legislation that allows for locally elected officials to make decisions that are beneficial to the interests of City residents;
- Opposing legislation that is detrimental to the City's ability to pursue citizen priorities or respond to local citizen concerns; and
- Supporting legislation that reduces the overall tax burden on residents and businesses without reducing vital funding for critical public safety services and other services on which residents depend on and expect.

In preparation for the 88th State Legislative Session, City Council created the 2022 Legislative Citizens Task Force (LTF) to provide a valuable public engagement component to the creation of the legislative agenda. It is comprised of 13 members of the public representing various interests throughout the community. Those interests include: independent homeowners. Home

public representing various interests throughout the community. These interests include independent homeowners, Home Owner's Associations, business interests, boards and commissions, graduates from Sugar Land 101, and students.

The LTF reviewed many of the City's legislative position statements and aided in the creation of several new positions related to mass violence/active shooter incidents, catalytic converter thefts, and solid waste franchise fees. On Tuesday, August 16, 2022, the Intergovernmental Relations Committee received a report of the LTF's findings and reviewed new preliminary position statements.

The draft was reviewed by the Intergovernmental Relations Committee on Tuesday, September 20, 2022.
